Spooky Halloween snacks make cooking with your toddler and healthy eating more fun this October! Experiment with the snacks below.



Monster Apples: spread some peanut (or other nut) butter between two apple slices to stick them together, then press sliced almonds or sunflower seeds in as spooky teeth! Eyes can be made out of mini marshmallows with a dot of Nutella and a slice of strawberry makes a silly tongue.

Jack-o-Lantern Mandarins: peel a mandarin and poke a celery stalk through the middle as a stem. Pipe a spooky face on the front with Nutella. Put a little Nutella in a Ziploc, clip the corner, and you have an easy piping bag to decorate!

Banana Ghosts: Slice bananas lengthwise, then cut a zig zag across the bottom. Use your Nutella piping bag to create spooky ghost faces!


Learn about Local Native Culture with your Toddler

Indigenous Peoples' Day is October 9th

Travel the Totem Trail (age 0-3)—Bring your little one to see the Totem Pole Trail located near Seward Street and Front Street in downtown Juneau. The poles now have signage that describe each totem in detail or you can pick up a guide book from SHI. Babies have an easier time focusing on high contrast objects during their early months of development. Black and white visuals with contrasting patterns (like formline design) are easy for your infant to focus on and can encourage their vision development. This can help with recognizing print in its various bold and big prints. Toddlers and older children can help recognize the animals on the totems and understand the stories that go along with each one.





With nights getting longer, add some interactive fun to your bedtime read-

ing routine. Any of the books from Imagination Library can be great bedtime reading, but Good Night, Gorilla lets your child help create the story with you. The book has few words and detailed illustrations—perfect for kids who are ready to search for context clues in the art so they can tell YOU the story! This style helps pre-readers engage in the story instead of being passive listeners. See how many details your
