

SEAAEYC FY23 ANNUAL REPORT

Expanding services to families, early educators, and community partners.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES

SEAAEYC directly reaches families through the Parents As Teachers (PAT) program. PAT is a home visiting program which pairs a parent educator with parents of children prenatal through age three, to increase parent knowledge of early childhood development.

The Juneau PAT program employed 3 full time and 1 part time home visitors.

PAT home visitors completed 694 personal visits and reached 110 children across 85 families in Juneau, Hoonah, and Yakutat.



SUPPORTING EARLY EDUCATORS

SEAAEYC works to improve the quality, availability, and affordability of child care in Juneau by distributing monthly operating stipends to child care businesses, biannual merit-based monetary awards for child care workers, and paid professional development opportunities.

SEAAEYC partnered to host a spring CDA Academy, supporting 15 educators to obtain the credential. In March, 198 educators from 16 communities attended the SEAAEYC annual early learning symposium.

SEAAEYC opened a child care start-up and expansion grant to encourage capacity growth.



COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

SEAAEYC houses and supports the Partnerships for Families & Children (PFC). PFC is Juneau's early childhood coalition made of 16 non-profit and state agencies working to provide all Juneau families with young children access to community resources that support their health, growth, and development.

SEAAEYC supports the monthly distribution of the Juneau Parent Bulletin, which reaches 2,110 individuals, organizes Family Turf Events, hosts Parenting Classes, manages the Diaper Bank, and coordinates Dolly Parton's Imagination Library in Southeast Alaska.

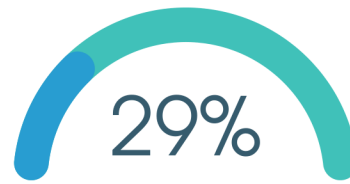

INCREASE IN FAMILIES SERVED

PAT home visitors served 85 families, with an average caseload of 24 families per full time staff. There was a 24% increase in families served per full time staff since FY22.



INCREASE IN CHILDREN SERVED

PAT home visitors served 110 children, with an average caseload of 31 children per full time staff. There was a 29% increase in children served per full time staff since FY22.

DEVELOPMENTAL, HEARING, AND VISION SCREENINGS NOTED DELAYS

PAT home visitors provided 147 screenings. Hearing & vision delays were noted in 2 children, and developmental delays were noted in 23 children. Children identified with delays are referred to specialists.

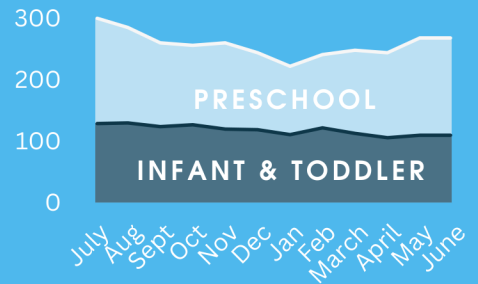

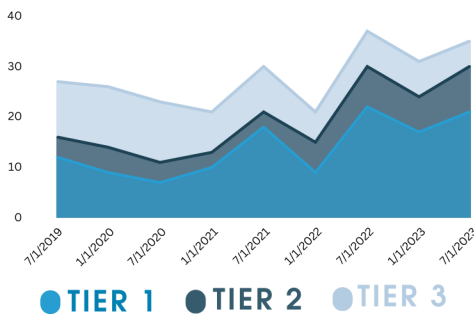

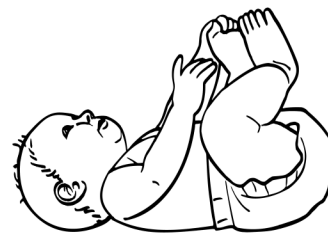
